### **HEADLINE NEWSCAST**

### 2 people per group

**Step 1:** Find **6** news articles from credible Internet news sites related to your subject matter. You will need to cut out, photocopy, or link to each article and **ATTACH** the articles to this assignment or Google Doc.

**Step 2:** As you read each article, answer the following questions: *Who, What, Where, When, Why, and How*. This will help you get the important information from the articles. Organize the information, listing the MOST important first. Use the inverted pyramid idea.

**Step 3:** Write a **NEWS BRIEF** for **each** article using casual language - write for the EAR not the EYE. How we SPEAK.

## Introduction Example:

"Teen attacks tobacco company, Man is sentenced to life in prison, and the Ladue tennis team are state champs. Good morning, I'm Jane Smith and I'm John Doe, and this is Ladue Headline News."

Closing Example: "Thank you for watching Ladue Headline News. I'm John Doe. And I'm Jane Smith. Have a good day."

### 2 minutes & 10 seconds = total (overall timing + or - 5 seconds leeway)

Section 1	Introduction	10 Seconds
Section 2	One International Story	20 Seconds
Section 3	One National Story	20 Seconds
Section 4	One Local Story	20 Seconds
Section 5	One School Story	20 Seconds
Section 6	One Sports Story	20 Seconds
Section 7	One Weather Story	10 Seconds
Section 8	Close	10 Seconds

#### **Details**

- Each group will have 5 minutes to record their newscast. That means you will have a chance to possibly record 2 attempts.
- Transitions between sections are required and must be placed at the beginning of the new section.

Transition examples:

"Around the globe....", "Closer to home...", "In the sporting world....", "Within the walls of Ladue...", "The Weather today calls for..."

- Transitions are included in the timing of the sections.
- Introduction must contain your full names, and a show title.
  - o (For example: This is Ladue Headline News and I'm \_\_\_\_\_ and I'm \_\_\_\_)
- Divide the announcing by alternating the reading of stories in each section.
- Each announcer must have a COMPLETE SCRIPT on their iPad.

#### Checklist

Directions -- Prior to your dry-run practices, make sure you have done ALL of the following:

- Each group is responsible for 6 news articles that meet the criterion: 1 international story, 1 national story, 1 local story, 1 Ladue story, 1 sports story, and 1 weather story.
- Each student must have answered on a sheet of paper or Google Doc, the 5 W's and H; Who, What, Where, Why, When and How
- Each student is responsible for 1 SCRIPT in Proper Copy Format. This script will be the same script as your partner.
- In your newscast, you must alternate between sections (international, national, etc)
- At the end of the assignment, you will turn in:
  - a. 6 news stories (Google Doc)
  - b. The 5 W's and H sheet you completed (Google Doc)
  - c. 1 script in Proper Copy Format (Google Doc)
  - d. An personal evaluation, and peer evaluation of YOUR newscast.

Newscast Delivery	Newscast was 2:10 minutes in length (+/-:05 seconds either way). Newscast was read conversationally, with proper emphasis and inflection. Newscaster showed improvement from 1st project, through dry-runs, through final taping. Newscaster was easy to understand, enunciated, and spoke clearly. Newscaster read at a consistent, easy pace, with appropriate volume.	Newscast was between 1:30 and 2:05 or over 2:10. and 2:15 Newscast occasionally sounded conversational and used some emphasis and inflection. Newscaster was difficult to understand, did not always enunciate or speak clearly. Newscaster did not maintain a consistent pace or volume.	Newscast was under 1:30 or over 2:15. Newscast was read without any emotion. Newscaster was difficult to understand throughout the newscast. Newscaster spoke too fast, too slow, too loud, or too quiet for the duration of the newscast.
